

Grand Prairie Water Conservation Ordinance

The Grand Prairie Water Conservation Plan, required by state law, outlines year-round water conservation efforts for residents and businesses. These requirements are in place regardless of whether drought conditions exist or not. Should a drought occur, stricter requirements could be enacted.

Highlights of the plan calls for:

- Watering of lawns after 6 p.m. and before 10 a.m. (and conversely, don't water from 10 a.m. 6 p.m.) year round
- If Mother Nature is watering, be it drizzle, rain, hail, snow or ice, turn sprinklers off
- Adjust sprinklers to water the lawn, not the concrete, stone, brick or other impervious surfaces
- Fix all broken or missing sprinkler heads
- Maintain a sprinkler system so that it does not waste water
- For systems installed after June 1, 2009, rain, wind, freeze sensors must be installed

The ordinance allows watering outside the parameters above for 30 days for the purpose of:

- Establishing hydromulch, grass sod or grass seed
- Dust control of a sport field
- Maintenance, repair or testing of an irrigation system
- Watering by use of a hand-held or soaker hose

Thorough, but infrequent watering (no more than every five days) develops deeper roots and plants that are healthier and more drought tolerant. Persons or companies who refuse to comply with the ordinance face fines up to \$2,000. For more information, contact the City of Grand Prairie Water Utilities at 972-237-8377. www.gptx.org



Uniform Election May 1, 2021

The uniform election date in May is for cities and school districts; water districts have their regular general elections for members of their governing bodies or special elections to fill vacancies.

The Mansfield ISD is holding a general election for two Board of Trustees seats up for re-election (Place 1 and Place 2; term expires 2024) and a special election for an open seat (Place 4; term expires 2022).

The City of Grand Prairie election is for Council terms ending in May 2021 for District 5, District 6 and District 8 At Large. All offices are for a three-year term. Grand Prairie residents will also be voting on Proposition A - \$75 Million Economic Development Bonds.



2021 Mira Lagos HOA Annual Meeting

he 2021 Mira Lagos HOA Annual Meeting was held virtually on Thursday, February 25, 2021 at 7:00 PM via Zoom. This meeting was conducted by FirstService Residential and the Mira Lagos HOA Board of Directors. It was attended by 80 homeowners.

A management overview and budget review were presented by Board Members Joshua Spare and Ken Self. For the election, there were two applicants who applied and were affirmed to the two available seats. Your new Board Members are Joshua Spare and Alex Marquez.

Guest speakers from the City of Grand Prairie included Chief of Police Daniel Scesney, Councilman John Lopez (District 4), Councilman Jeff Wooldridge (District 6), and Councilman Greg Giessner (District 8 At Large). A PID report was presented by Joshua Spare.

Following Chief Scesney's presentation on safety and theft prevention, questions were submitted by chat asking about when to contact the police regarding speeding, running stop signs, suspicious persons, or loud and disruptive parties or noise. Chief Scesney said, "Call anytime you see something. Call 911. It's okay." He continued, "Please reach out to us. We can't fix problems we don't know about."

Our councilman shared on COVID-19 statistics, the winter storm emergency and recovery, a request for residents to take a rolling cart survey, the fishing dusk to dawn ordinance, a short-term rental ordinance, and peninsula development projects. In addition, a detailed presentation was given on a \$75 million economic development bonds proposal that voters will see as



Proposition A

WHAT WILL I SEE ON THE BALLOT?


CITY OF GRAND PRAIRIE, TEXAS PROPOSITION A

The issuance of \$75 million general obligation bonds for promoting economic development within the city and the imposition of a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

The proposition supports economic development and revitalization of commercial, retail, residential and mixed-use development and neighborhoods throughout the city, such as corridor and facade improvements, land acquisition and other development and redevelopment investments in targeted areas within the community.

- Historic Downtown: Land purchases, mixed use development and infrastructure.
- Targeted Growth: Land and/or building purchases, a conference hotel, restaurant lease space and entertainment sites.
- City Gateways: Land purchases or development of entertainment venues and infrastructure/parking for hospitality, retail, mixed use and commercial.



WHERE WOULD THIS DEVELOPMENT TAKE PLACE?

Economic Development Hot Zones

WHAT ARE BONDS?

- General obligation (GO) bonds are commonly used to finance city projects that cost more than available cash, much like home loans.
- GO bonds require voter approval. Investors buy government bonds as stable long-term investments.
- Grand Prairie has a AAA rating from Standard & Poor's, which
 is the highest possible bond rating and allows the City to pay
 lower interest rates on bonds.
- The last voter approved bond issue was in 2001 for \$76 million for public safety, streets, signals and storm drainage.

WHY ISSUE BONDS TO PAY FOR CITY PROJECTS?

- Bonds are used for capital projects that require more cash than available, like a home loan.
- Bond debt is repaid over time, usually around 20 years.
- Like buying a house, major economic development projects have a long life.
- Their cost is typically spread out over many years and paid for by current and future residents and visitors who use them.

HOW WILL THE CITY REPAY THE BONDS?

- Bonds would be repaid through a portion of the city's property tax revenues plus new revenue streams created by projects made possible with bond money.
- Bonds are generally issued based on a 20-year amortization schedule and are only issued as expenses are incurred to fund approved bond projects.



WILL THIS INCREASE MY PROPERTY TAX RATE?

- The bond issue is not expected to affect the property tax rate.
- However, should the economy decline, bond debt would still be due, and the city might have to cut services, reduce its existing capital project program or consider a property tax rate increase to cover debt payments.
- If the bond election fails, bond projects would not happen unless other ways to finance them could be found.

HAS THE CITY RECENTLY INCREASED ITS PROPERTY TAX RATE?

- No.
- While increases in valuations result in additional property tax owed, Grand Prairie's property tax rate has not increased in the past 29 years.
- The last increase was in 1992.
- The property tax rate was reduced in 1997 and 2000.

HOW WILL THE BONDS BE USED?

If approved by voters, economic development endeavors may include:

- Buying land and building infrastructure for eligible projects
- Constructing facilities that might include hotels, restaurants or parking structures for hospitality or entertainment projects.
- Financing projects, preferably with long-term revenue streams to the City.
- Awarding grants or loans to development projects.

When washing your car at home, wash with only water or use biodegradable soap. It is also suggested, where possible (but not in Mira Lagos HOA), to wash your vehicle on a lawn or other unpaved surface. Since parking on the lawn is not an option in Mira Lagos HOA, use water and biodegradable soap or better yet take your car to a professional car wash.

"Don't Bag It" Lawn Care Plan

To help save valuable space in our city landfill, Grand Prairie does not pick up grass clippings from your curb or alley. Between March and September, the volume of residential solid waste increases 20-50 percent because of grass clippings.

By leaving your clippings on the lawn after you mow and allowing them to work back into the soil, you can have a naturally beautiful lawn. Grass clippings also make excellent compost for gardens.



Doing less to your lawn can improve the health of your grass. Here are eight easy steps to an easy lawn improvement program:

- 1. Mow Less Longer blades of grass allow the lawn to take in more sunlight and crowd out weeds.
- 2. Stop Raking If you cut off just a third of the blade, you can leave the clippings as free fertilizer.
- 3. Stop Dethatching Too Only dethatch on lawns that have been over fertilized. Thatch, a buildup of roots and leaves just above the soil, isn't a problem.
- **4.** Fertilize Less Generally, researchers say, most grasses do just fine with a total of three pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet in at least three carefully timed treatments over a season.

- 5. Spray Less Herbicide Healthy grass should crowd out weeds.
- 6. Spray Less Insecticide If you have bug problems, diagnose first. Call your extension agent if you need help identifying what bug is eating your grass.
- 7. Water Less A typical lawn can soak up 10,000 gallons of water a summer, which can increase your water bill by 50 percent. One solution: Wean your lawn from water. Wait until a footprint doesn't spring back, then water as little as 1/4 inch a week just to keep the roots alive. If it's very dry, protect your lawn by cutting down on traffic.
- **8.** Accept Imperfection If the site gets fewer than four hours of sun or is otherwise unsuited for grass, try another ground cover.

MOWING PLAN

The rule of thumb for mowing home lawns is not to remove more than 1/3 of the leaf surface at any one time. With this mowing schedule you no longer need to bag your grass clippings.

Grass clippings left on your lawn will not contribute to thatch, but they will return valuable nutrients to the soil. They usually contain about 4% nitrogen, .5% phosphorous and about 2% potassium, as well as all of the necessary minor elements plants need.

WATERING PLAN

During the driest period of summer, our lawns usually require about I inch of water every 5-6 days. Most hose sprinklers apply 1/4 to 1/3 inch of water per hour, so they would need to run approximately four hours in one spot. If the water runs off the lawn before one inch is applied, turn the sprinkler off, let the water soak in for about an hour, and then continue watering.

The best time to water is early morning, so less water is lost by evaporation. The worst time to water is in the evening because the lawn stays wet all night. This encourages diseases to develop.

Lawns watered too frequently tend to develop shallow root systems, which make them more susceptible to grub damage.

FERTILIZING PLAN

The best way to find out which analysis of fertilizer is ideal for your lawn, how much fertilizer your lawn needs and when that fertilizer should be applied is to soil test. A kit with complete instructions is available through the Dallas or Tarrant County Extension Office.

If soil testing is not convenient, following this plan will work for most lawns, but a soil test is the best way to go.

The rate of fertilizer application, the frequency of application, the ratio of nutrients in fertilizer and the source of nitrogen all have a great deal to do with how fast the lawn grows.

This fertilizer plan is designed to allow the lawn to grow at a moderate rate and still have good color.

For slow, even growth, use a fertilizer containing either sulfur-coated urea or ureaformaldehyde as a nitrogen source rather than soluble forms. The soluble forms, such as urea or ammonium sulfate, tend to produce very fast growth for short periods
